In 1972 Dr. Phillip K. Wood of Columbus, Ohio devoted his career to treating and rehabilitating people with physical disabilities. During his career he saw the talents, capabilities, determination, and courage of people with disabilities. As a result he was inspired to establish Ms. Wheelchair America as a forum to promote the achievements and accomplishments of women who use wheelchairs full time for all public mobility, as well as the needs of all people with apparent physical disabilities.

The mission of Ms. Wheelchair America is to provide an opportunity of achievement for women who use wheelchairs for 100% of public mobility to successfully educate and advocate for the more than 62 million Americans living with disabilities. The Ms. Wheelchair America organization is NOT a beauty pageant and is based solely on advocacy. The organization is a non-profit 501(c)(3) ran solely by volunteers and just celebrated it's 50th anniversary!

PURPOSE AND GOALS OF THE ORGANIZATION

The Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania Organization is an affiliate of the Ms. Wheelchair America Organization. Once a year, in October the Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania Organization holds a competition to select the next spokeswoman for people with disabilities who shows their passion, drive, motivation, and ability to articulate their platforms effectively. The titleholder must be able to communicate and educate the public, business community, lawmakers; regarding the dignity, productiveness, and value of people with disabilities. Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania continues to eliminate the architectural and attitudinal barriers that prevent people with disabilities from living in society equitably.

The Titleholder for Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania has several duties. During their reign they will have the opportunity to travel across the Keystone State, visit advocacy/civic groups, make public appearances, and conduct interviews. Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania will promote their chosen platform In various settings. They will serve as a positive authentic role model for the next generation of Americans with disabilities to know they are capable of leaving their own legacy. The Titleholder's commitment and personal examples serve to further the mission of Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania. They will also get to represent our Commonwealth at the National Competition happening in Grand Rapids, Michigan August 2022. There she will compete for the title of Ms. Wheelchair America 2023.



This competition is made up of a variety of activities. These activities allow the judging panel time with each contestant, while enabling the competitors an opportunity to share with each other and develop friendships. They become stronger advocates throughout the weekend while attending several workshops that help develop skills that heighten awareness on issues within the community. Workshops are designed to open a dialogue between the women about their thoughts, ideas, values, and experiences.

Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania is one of the only state organizations with a structured Ambassador program within the Ms. Wheelchair America Organization. The purpose of this program is to continue to provide opportunities of growth and connection with one another to become better advocates. This also will help them in the future if they choose to compete for the Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania title again. The biggest barrier our participants face is lack of funding to travel to events. We are continuously looking to expand and grow to offer more opportunities for women wheelchair users to be included in the sisterhood.

Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania is also a non-profit 501(c)(3) organization staffed and coordinated solely by volunteers from many different community organizations, businesses, private citizens, and previous Titleholders from across Pennsylvania. It is through monetary and in-kind support of many sponsors that this event is able to take place. Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania is actively seeking volunteers and sponsors; appreciating any kind of support that is offered.





A Farewell from the 2020 Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania

When I was crowned Ms. Wheelchair Pennsylvania 2020, I had no idea what the world had in store. I dreamed of traveling the state from end to end to share my platform of "Inclusive Body Positivity for People with Disabilities," something I am endlessly passionate about. As a new wheelchair user, achieving the title of Ms. Wheelchair PA 2020 was not something I had ever considered a possibility, I simply just wanted to find a community to help me relearn to navigate the world on wheels, and boy, did I achieve that goal! I gained not only a crown, but an instant support network full of wheelsisters who understood the intricacies of wheeling through life.

Before COVID-19 shut down the world, I appeared at Ms. Wheelchair NJ Competition and Crowning Event, had the chance to speak at JCCLV's "Celebrating Our Differences" and Pittston Area School District's "Love Your Neighbor" themed in-service/ teacher education conference, and volunteered at Disability Pride PA's MLK Day of Service event. As restrictions tightened and events were canceled, I turned to social media and Zoom to find opportunities, and was able to host a Titleholder Q&A on Facebook, as well as participate in the Disability Pride PA Virtual events, including the Ms. Wheelchair PA roundtable "We are NOT a Pageant." Additionally, in the tail end of 2020 and throughout 20201,I was able to appear at a wide variety events as an "bonus titleholder" thanks to the generosity of Jessica (Ms. Wheelchair 2021), who graciously agreed to sharing her year due to our experiences with the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020. This allowed me to continue to share my platform at the Miracle League of the Lehigh Valley's Annual Trick or Treat for those with disabilities and their families/caregivers, partner with a local nonprofit to speak about my platform on Zoom and appear at the Lehigh Vallev Pride Festival and Abilities Expo. MWPA opened many doors for professional development opportunities as well, such as the ability to participate in the TRAIL program, and through that, was able to speak at a Tele-Town Hall with Moms Rising and Congresspeople Susan Wild and Dwight Evans, and better my advocacy skills with the support of former Ms. Wheelchair America 2012, Dr. Josie Badger.

As for personal growth, I can only say that MWPA has allowed me to truly find my voice in leadership. I could not have succeeded in the program without the ongoing support of Barb Zablotney and Kristin Rebstock, who continuously provided guidance and support during the highs and lows of virtual events and Zoom-induced burnout. I am so grateful for this opportunity and I wish all involved with this

Have fun, make memories and make a difference!!







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
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Amanda Urgolites

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

After completing her rehabilitation at Methodist Rehabilitation Hospital in Jackson Mississippi, she went on to finish her BA in Psychology. Next, she obtained a Master's Degree in Social Work, also from Louisiana State University and became a Licensed Clinical Social Worker. Most of her Social Work career was spent working with patients in physical

rehabilitation hospitals in Baton Rouge Louisiana. The past five years she has worked at Numotion, and is now the Numotion Brand Ambassador. Her proudest achievement is that she had three kids after sustaining her injury. Caroline, Austin and Joseph are all now young adults and they are the joy of her life.

Karen's passion is advocacy for the people with disabilities. This includes over a decade of being on the board for the Brain and Spinal Cord Injury Association of Louisiana, which is also the Louisiana Chapter of United Spinal Association. Karen is also the State Coordinator for Ms. Wheelchair Louisiana and an active peer mentor for the United Spinal Association.

She is the former **Ms. Wheelchair Louisiana 2018** and went on to win the title of **Ms. Wheelchair America 2019**. 



As an advocate for the many people living with a disability Kimberly performs and speaks throughout the Washington DC Metropolitan area for many different social events leaving crowds in awe.

Kimberly has become well known for her immense rendition and performance of "The National Anthem" in which she has had the opportunity to deliver on many different occasions. Kimberly's strapping yet illuminating sound captivates and commands her audience's attention.

Kimberly is the former **Ms. Wheelchair Maryland 2015** and placed 3rd runner up as Ms. Wheelchair America 2016.
