What this entailed was digging a foxhole up to the armpits of the tallest person in the squad, which included three of us, while also using the dirt to fill sandbags for perimeter coverage. We started digging the hole at around 10 p.m. and didn't finish until around 3 a.m. Upon completion, we all slept in the foxhole feeling extremely proud about what we had accomplished in preparation for the simulated battle.



Just two hours after falling asleep, we were awakened by the officers who were the referees that officiated the simulated battle. They informed us that our foxhole was deep enough, but the sandbags that were used to provide cover would not have protected us. They disqualified us from taking part in the simulated battle and we were told to fill the hole back up.

We were highly disappointed for several reasons, mainly because we worked all night and wouldn't get to participate in the simulation. But looking back on that event, it taught me patience, teamwork and a very high degree of attention to detail.
